

A MESSAGE FROM IAN DOUGLAS

PRESBYTERY MISSION PLAN UPDATE

Since the last magazine The Presbytery Mission Plan (PMP) was agreed at all levels within the Church of Scotland and confirmed that for ourselves the three churches – Bellshill Central Parish Church, Bellshill West Parish Church and Bothwell Parish Church – should move towards becoming a single unit. There will be two full-time Ministers of Word and Sacrament. There will be two worship centres, one in Bothwell and one in Bellshill. The buildings decision in Bellshill is currently deferred (no decision has been made).

What is next?

The Implementation Team from The Presbytery of Forth Valley and Clydesdale (FVAC) now have the task of implementing the PMP.

For ourselves we don't see any immediate change. However, the three congregations with the team from FVAC have much to do.

Church union is a complex and lengthy process. On the legal side of things, church law requires a document called the “Basis of Union” to be prepared and approved; other formalities are required to comply with charity law. Practically, there are many, many aspects of everyday church life which must be merged. And, emotionally, members face the challenge of adapting to a changing congregational community.

As a congregation, our Interim Moderator, along with our Kirk Session with the team from FVAC and cluster churches, will eventually agree a **Basis of Union** which will include

- Name of United congregation
- Places of worship
- Parish area
- Type of governance (Kirk Session)
- Ministry arrangements
- Manses

Our Interim Moderator and Kirk Session with the team from FVAC and cluster churches will also eventually agree a **Basis of Team Ministry**, that defines how the proposed Team Ministry will operate. This will also agree which of the two Ministers of Word and Sacrament will be the Moderator of the Kirk Session.

All three congregations will then vote to accept or not accept these two documents.

If the **Basis of Union** is rejected by any of the congregations, then it is not approved, and Union cannot proceed at this time. However, it will not prevent the Union because Presbytery has already taken that decision; it will only delay the Union.

Likewise, a congregation can reject the **Basis of Team Ministry**. This will not prevent the Team Ministry, just delay how it might look.

The congregations of Bellshill Central and Bellshill West will also vote to accept the **Revd Iain Majcher**, if he wishes to be a Minister of the Ministry Team. (This is a similar vote to when a congregation “calls” a Minister to a vacant charge.) Neither Bellshill Central nor Bellshill West have ever accepted Revd Majcher as their Minister so each need to vote on this matter. Both congregations need to vote to accept Revd Majcher. If he is rejected by either of the two congregations then this portion of the Union cannot proceed. Again, it would only delay the Union process.

If any part of the process is rejected by one or more of the congregations, it would be very likely that FVAC would begin conversations with the three Kirk Sessions and Congregations, separately and together, to devise a positive way forward.

Nothing much happens with Guild members during the summer, other than monthly outings to local places to either spend money or enjoy a cuppa and a natter, which is always a necessity!

The first of our outings was in June to the local Mackinnon Mills - the ladies always looking for a bargain. We are fortunate to have several drivers and numbers attending are usually low, but nevertheless still go ahead for the few ladies who enjoy the outing.

The August outing was to Gouldings at Rosebank, where the cream cakes are to die for and are high on the list of “must haves.”

A suggestion was made by one of our members to have a pre-session get together with a meal at Wishaw Golf Club in September where on Thursdays, they cater for a three course “Recycled Teenage Menu” for an amazing £8.50! More details will follow in the next Chronicle.

Our new session commences on Monday 7th October at 2 pm with a Joint Communion Service with Guild members from Burnhead Parish Church, which Rev. Margaret Rose will be leading. This has been a long-standing arrangement with friends from Burnhead going back to the time of Macdonald Memorial, Orbiston and Burnhead Guilds and is a lovely way to meet up with old friends.

The Guild session then begins on Monday 14th October when the syllabus for the following six months is presented. A very full and varied syllabus is planned, and we look forward to meeting up with old and new members.

It is with sadness I mention the death of Jenny McEwan in July. Jenny was a long-standing Guild member of over 57 years and will be missed by her Church family as well as her own family and friends.

CHURCH HISTORY - Information taken from: 'Annals of Macdonald Memorial U.F. Church' (1924)

Last year (2023) was an important year for us as we marked the 150th Anniversary of the inception of our Church. There were various significant dates which we celebrated last year:

January 1873: The Free Church Presbytery of Hamilton thought that, due to the spiritual destitution in the area, there was need for a Mission in Mossend/Bellshill. At the time, there was a population of around 7,000 and there were three Churches in existence:

- the E.U., which is still a place of worship on the Main Street at Mossend
- the Methodist, which is now used by the local Orange Order
- the United Presbyterian, which is now known as St Andrew's United Free

August 1873: A new Minister had been appointed at Holytown Free Church (now known as Wrangholm) but some of the congregation were not happy with the appointment. They held a meeting somewhere in Bellshill with a view to setting up a Mission Station. Messrs Neilson offered the use of Mossend School Room and Mossend Mission Station was established.

October 1873: The Lord's Supper was observed for the first time when Rev Ogilvy, from Motherwell Dalziel Free Church, conducted the service. There were 63 communicants present. This date is commemorated in one of the windows above the organ pipes where a communion cup and the date can be seen in the stained glass.


December 1873: By the end of 1873, no less than 300-450 people assembled to worship God each Sunday at both diets of worship. By this time, Mossend Mission Station was under the care of Rev McKenzie from Chapelhall Free Church.

We still have things to celebrate in 2024 as we look back on the 150th anniversary of important events in 1874:

May 1874: It was agreed that Mossend Mission should become a Ministerial Charge.

October 1874: Negotiations took place regarding how much should be paid to Edinburgh. Offers of £52 and £78 were refused before the congregation finally agreed to pay £100 per year so it was approved that a Minister could be called. With agreement reached on financing, Presbytery agreed to proceed with a Call to Mr William Macdonald, who was then a Probationer of the Free Church of Scotland and who was willing to accept the invitation.

31 December 1874: Presbytery met in Mossend School room for the Ordination and Induction of William Macdonald as the first Minister of what would now be Bellshill Free Church. A large and enthusiastic congregation was assembled. As it turned out, due to normal rotation of responsibilities, it fell to the Minister of Holytown Free Church (Wrangholm) to preach the sermon at the Ordination. (This must have been the same minister that had caused the original group to leave Holytown (Wrangholm) and set up the Mission in Mossend! His name is not mentioned.)

We left Bellshill and headed up towards Newhouse where we took a right turn heading for Newmains and then Carluke. It all sounds rather boring, just sitting in a car but that is when we do most of our talking. What do we talk about? That is the million-dollar question. We talk about anything that comes up. Topics vary from the colour of the car to that is where we'd done someone's funeral or on this occasion, we passed a building just coming into Newmains that we both decided would make a good Funeral Parlour.


So, on we go into Carluke heading for Peebles. Now we are heading on through the village of Kilncadzow where they used to have the best bakery/café in the area. Here you could buy a bridie or sausage roll which could feed at least two people each. Their chocolate eclairs were massive. Now it is time to look for the white stick. Why, you ask? Because we're coming to a BLIND SUMMIT. (Think about it). At the top of the hill, we have decided that the council needs to put in a lay-by or small car park. On a clear day the view you can get from here is fantastic. While the driver keeps an eye on the road the passenger can look all around. Our next puzzle is to decide on a flavour as we approach the HIDDEN DIP.

Down the hill we go until we come to a roundabout and here, we turn left toward Forth. A mile along this road we come to Hickety Pickety tearoom, and this is our stop for lunch. We have tasted some fantastic soups on our travels but today was a first for PIGS in BLANKETS BROTH, and it was good. On leaving the tearoom if you turn right, you head toward Forth and Climpy, if you turn left, you head back to the roundabout. We turned left. At the roundabout left takes you to

Carnwath, right takes you back to Kilncadzow and Carluke and straight through takes you to Lanark, coming in past the fire station. We decided to go straight across. This road takes you to the level crossing at Cleghorn and guess what, that's right it was closed to let a train through. Crossing the level crossing the road takes a very sharp right turn heading for Lanark but there is also a road to the left that we had never travelled before, so here we go again, into the unknown.

This road took us through the quaint village of Cleghorn and then into a junction with the A743 at Ravenstruther where we took a right turn and headed for Lanark. From here it was a straight run down the Clydeside and home.

LORNA'S 2024 CHALLENGE. THE GREAT GLENCOE CHALLENGE!

Those who know me, know that I do a challenge or two each year for charity depending on what and how big the challenge is.

I have done several of these over the years from freefall abseiling, canoeing almost 100 miles in 3 days, running and muddy obstacle events so when my friend asked if I fancied doing The Great Glencoe challenge I thought, absolutely and signed up to The Dangleberries team (yes, my friend has a worse sense of humour than me!)

My friend's daughter who is 33yrs old was diagnosed with terminal cancer in her blood, spine and lymph nodes.

To say the family and close friends were devastated was an understatement however the support that the Maggie Centre has given the family and kids is nothing short of phenomenal so raising money for them was the least that we could do to show our appreciation.

The event itself was to walk 26.6 miles in under 12hrs. The route took in the Devil's Staircase, part of the West Highland way, up over Kinlochleven, finishing at Glen Nevis.

In my head I thought it's walking.... I can do this easy....I've done Ben Nevis, Ben Lomond and other Munros.....not thinking for a minute that this was over 10 years ago where now I am slightly older with a few added pounds that sneaked on! but...My determination and positive mindset (aka stubbornness) would not let me fail!

So, on Saturday 6 July 2024 we set off at 6am in the beautiful sunshine full of laughs, taking in the scenery, discovering new areas where I could safely cold water dip and generally find myself 'loving life'.

We arrived at the first check point...Quick toilet and water stop before we were on our way again, heading for the Devil's Staircase.

The organisers however had different ideas and rather than walking the path our route took us across the peat bogs...I was up to my knees in mud, stepping in areas that looked and felt hard but on moving across from one area to the next was not! We slipped, fell, laughed at each other and cursed...well I did as I thought I wasn't getting my leg out at one point 

Eventually we reached the bottom of the staircase for the long climb up. The views were spectacular once we reached the top.... we really do live in a beautiful country.

The rest of the walk to the halfway point at Kinlochleven was on a path which gave the bottom half of my clothing time to dry out and I ignored the squelching in my boots!

It was just before lunchtime that we reached Kinlochleven, I changed to dry socks thinking I would be fine for the rest of the walk; had a quick bite but didn't feel overly hungry.

We made our way out of Kinlochleven, starting our ascent back up into the hills and countryside.

I had heard people saying the Devil's staircase was a breeze compared to what I was currently climbing and at that moment I thought nah this is lovely and not too bad.... boy how quickly was I agreeing with them!

I felt as though I was climbing forever, happy when I saw the path level out, only to turn and see the next part of the ascent....I could have cried real tears at that point however God decided he would cry for me and opened up the waterworks instead and kept that tap on for the majority of the last leg.

We trudged along the path dodging the streams. The chat and laughter quickly stopped as the path turned into a river. There was no escape from the elements...even the sheep in the hills wanted the rain the stop!

We made it to the next check point, replenished our supplies as we passed by the sign telling us 6 miles to go.

By this time, I was feeling tired, my legs and hips were screaming at me but I was completing this challenge even if I had to crawl over that finish line.

The last few miles felt like the longest part of the challenge. As we got closer to the finish, we could hear the music coming from the tents which perked me up although I couldn't have walked any faster if my life depended on it lol.

WHAT IS GIFT AID?

Gift Aid is a government scheme which allows a congregation, as a registered charity, to claim 25p from HMRC every time an individual donates £1. The donor must have made a Gift Aid declaration giving the congregation permission to claim on their offerings and donations.

The donor must be a UK tax payer and have paid as much or more income tax and/or capital gains tax in the tax year than will be reclaimed through Gift Aid on their donations.

Common Myths

You need to tell us your income – **NO**

You need to tell us what you donate – **YES**, but we will know that through your FWO envelopes or bank transfer. Only Zandra, June and Donis know these details.

What does Gift Aid do to your offerings?

If your weekly offering was £5, that would turn it into £6.25 at no additional cost to you.

Last year we were able to reclaim £5012.80 in Gift Aid from the UK Government. If you were able to join the scheme or increase what you are able to donate to the work of our church, we would be able to increase our reclaim amount in 2024.

If you want to fill in a Gift Aid declaration form, please speak to Zandra Swan or Donis Hudson. If you want to check you are still part of the scheme, again speak to Zandra or Donis.
