MISSION PLAN UPDATE

In December the Kirk Session and Congregational Board met with the Chairman and two members of the Presbytery Implementation Committee.

At that meeting we were informed that at its next meeting, the Presbytery would be asked to agree to a change to the Mission Plan as it affected Bellshill and Bothwell, and that Bellshill Central Parish Church would no longer be part of the tripartite arrangement previously agreed.

This had not been our decision, but we were invited to bring to the Implementation Committee our options and ideas with regard to the future. We asked the Committee for help, and insight into the decisions from Bellshill West and Bothwell Kirk Sessions. We were not given any insight. We asked if mediation would be useful in moving forward, but the Presbytery Implementation Committee advised they did not believe it would be.

A small working group, (consisting of myself, Drew Aitken, Emily Aitken, Alan Mathew, Derek Pope, Zandra Swan and Lorna Watson) met to bring together options and ideas ahead of a joint Kirk Session and Board meeting to be held in January.

The Kirk Session and Board met on 14th January, and it was agreed that we would inform the Presbytery Implementation Committee of our willingness and readiness to speak with others and look to form a new cluster with another congregation, whilst exploring options for closer working with Orbiston Neighbourhood Centre.

The Presbytery Implementation Committee presented the following proposal to Presbytery at its meeting on Saturday 8th February, and it was approved.

The Presbytery approve a change to the Presbytery Mission Plan in relation to Cluster W6 (Bellshill Central, Bellshill West and Bothwell) as follows:

- unites Bellshill West and Bothwell;
- allocates staffing of 1 Minister of Word and Sacrament (MWS) and 0.5 Ministries Development Staff to Bellshill West/Bothwell
- allocates 0.5 MWS to Bellshill Central;
- categorises the Bellshill West Sanctuary as B;
- categorises the Bellshill West Halls as A;
- continues the classification of Bellshill Central as B* pending further consideration of the place of this congregation in the Presbytery Mission Plan.

We await further conversations with Presbytery, the Presbytery Implementation Committee and any potential new cluster partners. We await further information on how a united Bellshill West and Bothwell affects a worshipping body in Bellshill and how our own worship and mission can be continued and built upon as we move forward.

At its meeting on 8th February the Presbytery gave permission for the congregation of Bellshill West to use their halls for worship and other activities as of 10th February.

Please be assured your Interim Moderator and office bearers are working diligently in the background to ensure our congregation's presence and witness in Bellshill is continued. The congregation and office bearers will be kept updated along each and every step of this process.

Finally, we ask for your prayers in this process. In your daily prayers both spoken and silent, please pray for our Church in Bellshill.

THE GUILD

Before we saw the end of 2024, a couple of speakers came along to our meeting. The first of these told us a lot about Glasgow City Mission and the work they carried out, much of which we did not know.

It is always good to have the opportunity to inform the congregation of the work and support the Guild gives to specific charities. In depth details are usually obtained from speakers who have attended our meetings.

UNIDA provided a power point presentation of the Undergraduate, Masters and PhD training programmes they provide for women to ministry and service in Brazil in Theology & Religious Studies. The last of the six projects we heard about was KAZUNZU – Village of Hope. The Vine Trust can be traced back to a project initiated by the Very Rev. Albert Bogle and the congregation of St Andrews Church of Scotland Bo'ness in response to the famine in Ethiopia in 1985.

Between 1st June 2021 and 20th January 2025, the National Guild supported and raised an amazing £545,230.63 for the six projects. Four new projects have been identified for the Guild's support over the next few years, which we look forward to finding out more and passing on.

Our last speaker before the Christmas holiday period told us about the genocide in Srebrenica. The stories we heard about and saw were most upsetting. The speaker gave us all badges to wear to remember atrocities that have been endured.

2025 began with a belated Christmas lunch at The Rolling Barrel that was enjoyed by 18 of our members. Good food and good company was a good start for the next few months.

Our very own Ian Douglas was the first speaker of the new year in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. Needless to say, Ian gave us an interesting and amusing insight into his life that was thoroughly enjoyed. Don't think we will ever look at platform shoes again without thinking about him!

The following week we heard an in-depth background about the life and loves of Robert Burns. There's always something we didn't know before about our Scottish Bard. Our very able speaker was a wealth of knowledge and has numerous topics he can speak about and will be returning on next year's syllabus.

At the time of writing, we have just enjoyed our annual Guest Night with Our Lady's Musical Society. It is always great to catch up with old friends from all the other churches in the area even though there are fewer Guilds still existing. Donations received on the night amounted to £383 and, on Sunday, 9 February, a cheque was handed over to Colin Toal, a member of our congregation and Director of the local charity, Lanarkshire Carers.

Another couple of speakers, including our own organist, are expected before we finish with a closing social in March.

During the summer months we have tried to maintain contact with members with monthly outings to local venues. Details are intimated at Church or via our Guild App.

A varied programme is already in the planning stages for the new session commencing in October and new members wishing to join us are always welcome, so why not come along?

WHAT IS GIFT AID?

Gift Aid is a government scheme which allows a congregation, as a registered charity, to claim 25p from HMRC every time an individual donates £1. The donor must have made a Gift Aid declaration giving the congregation permission to claim on their offerings and donations. The donor must be a UK tax payer and have paid as much or more income tax and/or capital gains tax in the tax year than will be reclaimed through Gift Aid on their donations.

Common Myths

You need to tell us your income – **NO**

You need to tell us what you donate – **YES**, but we will know that through your FWO envelopes or bank transfer. Only Zandra, June and Donis know these details.

What does Gift Aid do to your offerings?

If your weekly offering was £5, that would turn it into £6.25 at no additional cost to you.

Last year we were able to reclaim £4,646.00 in Gift Aid from the UK Government. If you were able to join the scheme or increase what you are able to donate to the work of our church, we would be able to increase our reclaim amount in 2025.

If you want to fill in a Gift Aid declaration form, please speak to Zandra Swan or Donis Hudson. If you want to check you are still part of the scheme, again speak to Zandra or Donis.

Pray

Share the Gospel on a regular basis and lead your church to do the same. The Gospel of Jesus Christ is the power of God to save a person from sin, and nothing grows a church like God's people getting right with Him and then sharing the Gospel with others.

Be a listening and community led church

Find out the significant needs in your community – what can we offer that would benefit our community – we could partner with other churches and groups to meet these needs. Effective ministry doesn't happen on its own, but can thrive with collaboration.

Being a listening church focussed on our community, can be a double-edged sword.

While it is our social responsibility towards our community, it does attract people to our church.

An example is holding a sports/health meeting in your community; or running a holiday club/event. Another example is cleaning the environment and handing out souvenirs to invite people to church.

We could host an online survey via the website or social media, so we know what would work, and that it's worth our time. Ask as many questions as possible instead of just diving headlong into an idea because it seems nice.

Get everyone involved

Every member and friend of BCPC should be involved in participation of some kind when it comes to carrying out the mission of the church.

The Church needs to keep its pulse on the congregation. What are the interests, needs, desires, and challenges? Sometimes, it takes creative thinking on how to get people involved. But don't be afraid to volunteer!

Sometimes we confuse hope with optimism. I live in hope but I am certainly not an optimist who assumes everything will work out well regardless. I know the best outcome must be planned for and worked at and we need help from others. We often hope for the best and prepare for the worst – pragmatic. We found our community values during the pandemic to help us get through but, sadly in many areas, we lost them again all too quickly when “normality” returned.

As a town, we have recently had to deal with the closure of two well-loved churches in West Parish Church and St Gerard’s Church. Things will be difficult for a time, but I am sure the congregations will work to stay strong, and the remaining churches will flourish.

Hope is essential to get through personal trials, local problems, national difficulties and worldwide conflicts.
